Livestock Disease Control Act 1994

ORDER DECLARING DISEASES AND EXOTIC DISEASES

Order in Council

The Lieutenant-Governor, as the Governor's Deputy, with the advice of the Executive Council under section 6 of the Livestock Disease Control Act 1994 –

- declares the contagious or infectious diseases and conditions listed in Schedule 1 to be diseases for the purposes of the Act; and
- declares the contagious or infectious diseases and conditions listed in Schedule 2 to be exotic (b) diseases for the purposes of the Act.

This Order comes into operation and has effect for 12 months from the day it is published in the Government Gazette.
